ERWIN, Thomas R.* 22 Aug 1862 Thomas Reed ERWIN
Private Erwin was age 19 when he entered service. He died 3 May 1864 at Alexandria, Louisiana of wounds received the same day near Snaggy Point on the Red River, Louisiana. The Roll of Honor says he is buried at Alexandria, Louisiana.

Photo at [Find a Grave](#) for stone of W R IRWIN. This soldier in plot B 443, according to Department of Veterans Affairs, died 12 Oct 1865. Alexandria National Cemetery looked in the old papers and found that the W R IRWIN was in Co B, 83rd Ohio. I researched this to make sure it was not Thomas ERWIN.

Hardesty's Historical and Geographical Encyclopedia. [Wayne County Ohio version] published in 1885, page496, Sugar Creek Twp section:

Thomas Reed Erwin was a boy of seventeen years of age when the first gun of the civil war was fired, and when he passed his 18th birthday he enlisted in the cause of good government; when he was twenty years and twenty -five days old he died in its defense. He was enrolled in Company D, 120th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, May 15, 1862, at Dalton, Wayne county, and was mustered in at Camp Mansfield in September following. He was never sick of absent from duty from his enlistment to his death, sharing the hardships his regiment underwent in the campaigns under Sherman and under Grant against Vicksburg, and in the battles of the campaigns in which his regiment participated, including Chickasaw Bayou, Arkansas Post, Thompsons Hill, Raymond, Black River Bridge, the forty-seven day siege of Vicksburg. Of his action in one of the assaults on Vicksburg he wrote home to his mother, "I fired so rapidly my gun got so hot I had to lay it down and take another." The last letter received from him by the loving home circle was addressed to a sister, and contained some pictures he had had taken for them all, and of which he said: "Look at them all you please." This letter dated April 23, 1864, said: "We are going to re-inforce Banks on Red River." Eleven days after it was written he was on Red river, in the City Belle, when it was disabled off Snaggy Point, and he was shot through the thigh, removed to a shanty near the river, where he bled to death, and was buried with several companions under the alien sod. This young patriot was born in Sugar Creek township, Wayne county, April 8, 1844, and he left to mourn their loss in his death, a loving father and mother, and four brothers, five sisters. His father, Cunningham Erwin, was born October 29, 1817, and died June 3, 1874, of liver complaint. He seemed always to mourn the son he had lost and never was the same after his death.

The mother of Thomas Reed Erwin, for whom this sketch is compiled, was Mary Ann Reed before her marriage, born December 6, 1824. She lives on the family farm in Sugar Creek township, one married son living with her, and two sons in Baughman township. Four of her daughters are married, and living in Wayne county, and the youngest is still with her. Her post office address is Dalton.
