


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TOTTEN, Hiram E.* 15 Aug 1862

1st Lieutenant Totten was age 23 when he entered service. He was promoted from 2d Lieut. to date on 14 Jan 1863; wounded 12 July 1863 in the battle of Jackson, Mississippi; he died 6 Oct 1863 of wounds received in action. No burial information in the Roll of Honor.



Presbyterian Celebration booklet: "Hiram B. Totten, law student, First Lieutenant, Co. E, 120th Regiment, O. V. I., in the Civil War, died at his home in Wooster, O., October 6, 1863, of wounds received in line of duty in battle at Jackson, Miss., July 12, 1863. He participated in all the service and battles of his regiment until wounded, including the siege and capture of Vicksburg, July 4, 1863."

History of Wayne County Ohio by Ben Douglass, page 426, states that Michael TOTTEN was married twice. His first wife was Louisa CRAWFORD. They had 2 children, Matilda and Henry. His second wife [16 Nov 1830] was Mrs. Susanna RAMSEY of Washington county, PA who was the daughter of William EWING. She was the widow of Samuel RAMSEY who died in November, 1824. Their children were Nancy, Susan, John, Enoch, Hiram E. and Melissa A. "Hiram was a Lieutenant in the 120th Regiment and in the battle of Jackson, Miss., after the surrender of Vicksburg, was struck with a shell from the effects of which he died with his parents, in Wooster, in about twelve weeks. He was a young man of decided mental endowments and was fitting himself for practice at the bar when he enlisted."

"Hiram E. Totten was born in Wayne county in 1838. He was a son of Michael Totten and brother of the late Col. Enoch Totten of Washington, D. C. He was raised upon a farm, but came to Wooster with his parents in 1858 and took the course of the Wooster High School. He read law with McSweeney and Given, and was admitted to the bar in 1861, when he opened an office in Wooster, meeting with professional patronage from the start, for he was a young man of equipment and brain, whom the public were willing to see, wanted to know, and were ready to

aid and appreciate.

But 'wild war's deadly blast' was blowing, the onset of arms between the Pine and the Palm had begun and his stout, young heart rebelled at the mention of the destruction of the Federal Union. His patriotism fixed his decision and he turned the keys of his office door, which, through the catastrophes of war, he was never permitted to re-open. He was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant and entered the Military service of the United States for three years, August 15, 1862. He actively assisted in recruiting Co. E, Capt. Benj. Eason, 120th O. V. I., his voice ringing with eloquent, pathetic, and patriotic words, earnestly urging the young men to give their service to their country.

He was promoted to first Lieutenant, January 14, 1863; wounded July 12, 1863, in the battle of Jackson, Miss., and died in Wooster October 6, 1863, of wounds received in action. The measure of military duty which he performed was included in the splendid achievements of his regiment from Chickasaw Bayou, Miss., in 1862 to that

fatal July.

When life was full of hope and all its tides were at their highest, grandest flow, he was named for rest; a man of brain and thought that 'called his friend his comrade' --that gem of human language which sometimes means but a little less than love and a little more than friendship -- that gentle salutation of the human heart which lives in all the languages of time -- that winds and turns and runs through all the joys and sorrows of the human race -- through deed and thought and dram, the rough song and toil and battle-field."
