

## Chapter 23 Consolidation

### Consolidation with the 114th OVI

On the **25th of November an order was issued from the head-quarters of Nineteenth Army Corps for a permanent consolidation of the One Hundred and Twentieth with the One Hundred and Fourteenth Ohio**, and carried into effect the next day, the One Hundred and Twentieth forming five companies of the new organization. Lieutenant-Colonel Kelly, of the One Hundred and Fourteenth Ohio, was made Colonel, and Major McKinley, of the One Hundred and Twentieth, Lieutenant-Colonel of the consolidated regiment. The following named officers of the One Hundred and Twentieth, rendered supernumerary by the consolidation, were honorably discharged: Lieutenant-Colonel Slocum, Captains Au, Harvey, Taylor, and Jones, and Lieutenants Van Osteren [sic] and Hughes. This ended the career of the One Hundred and Twentieth as a regimental organization. It entered the service in 1862 with nine hundred and forty-nine officers and men. **About one hundred and fifty recruits joined it in 1864, and when merged into the One Hundred and Fourteenth Ohio, on the 27th day of November, 1864, but four hundred and forty of the whole number remained. Up to this time the aggregate number of killed in action, died of wounds and disease, and discharged because of disability, was six hundred.**

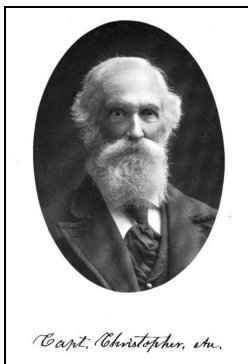

On consolidation the following officers of the 120th were honorably discharged: Lieutenant-Colonel Slocum, Captains Au, Harvey, Taylor and Jones, and Lieutenants Van Ostern and Hughes.

This ended the career of the 120th as a regimental organization. It was a good regiment, but was overwhelmed with a series of disasters."

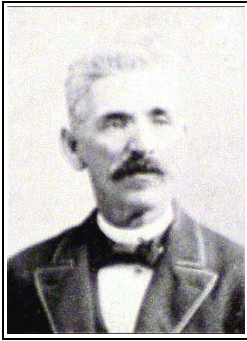

Christopher Au, Company I, 120th OVI

At the time of the consolidation, Christopher Au, Captain of Co A, was assigned to one company of the 114<sup>th</sup> and his men to another. "...this occasioned great dissatisfaction to the Captain and his company, who were quick to make known their opposition. The Captain was then mustered out and he returned home. He was afterward tendered a colonelcy in a new organization, but he declined to accept the appointment. With the exception of one month's furlough, which he spent at home, he was never off duty for a single day while with his command."

"Mr. Arehart took part in the fighting at Graham's plantation [near Alexandria, LA], May 5 to May 7, 1864; at [Avoyelle's Prairie] Prairie Bayou, May 14 to 16; at [Bayou de Glaise May 18] De Glaise, May 16, 1864; [Transfer to 114th OH] in the siege of Mobile, March 26 to April 8, 1865; and in **the warfare at Fort Blakely**, April 2 to 9, 1865. July 24 following he was transferred to Company E, Forty-eighth Regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantry, and was discharged from the service at Houston, Texas, October 4, 1865.." Page 236 "On November 21, 1864, the regiment [the 114th Ohio] was ordered from Morganza, to which point it had proceeded from Alexandria, to the **mouth of the White River, Arkansas, and at this place was consolidated with the 120th Ohio**. On December 6th the regiment was ordered to Morganza [LA]. On January 8, 1865, it moved to **Kenna, Alabama**, and on the 24th moved to **Barrancas, Florida**, [Pensacola] where it remained up to [May] 1865, when it was sent with other forces to Texas."

[pg 471]"Upon rejoining his regiment at New Orleans, January 7, 1865, Capt. Baer found it consolidated into two companies and assigned to the One Hundred and Fourteenth O. V. I., his company receiving the letter 'K.' Joining Gen. Steele at Pensacola, Fla., he was detailed as acting aide-de-camp on the General's staff, and served with him during the Florida campaign. With two companies, being the remnant of the One Hundred and Twentieth Regiment, he charged the enemy's works at Fort Blakeley, Ala., capturing their main line and taking possession of the village, a portion of his men carrying axes, in place of rifles, with which to cut away the obstructions they [pg 472]encountered. From that point the command proceeded to Mobile [AL], and joined the division of Gen. C. C. Andrews. In June, 1865, they were sent to Texas, and Capt. Baer was appointed ordnance officer of the District of Texas, serving on the staffs of both Gen. Andrews and Gen. Joseph A. Mower until his discharge. His position was a difficult and responsible one, as all arms were turned over to him while the troops were being discharged."

page 464 "High ranking officer being still a prisoner of war, the position devolved on himself and his command consisted of the remnants of G, I, H and K Companies of the 120<sup>th</sup> Ohio and constituted Company K, of the 114<sup>th</sup> Ohio Infantry. The regiment went to



Branco, Fla., on transports and connected with the Department under General Steele and marched to Pensacola, and thence to the operations on the Mobile & Montgomery railroad. Their next service was in the right wing in the siege of Spanish Fort and Fort Blakely, (April 8<sup>th</sup>) 80 volunteers from the regiment forming a skirmish line of the assaulting brigade at Fort Blakely. The outposts had been fortified with fallen trees and every third man was provided with an ax to remove obstructions. The deploy moved a mile and a half, guided by the bugle and took in the rebel skirmish line three quarters of a mile from the redoubt. Then they encountered fallen timber with the limbs lopped and sharpened and spaces filled to make a solid barricade. Three quarters of an hour were consumed in proceeding 80 rods, hard labor being performed by the ax-men in removing the rubbish. The next obstruction was a network of telegraph wires stretched six inches from the ground, which they cut and next, torpedoes were found placed in their way, composed of 60-pound shells placed in the ground and so disposed as to explode by pressure of six pounds. One of them exploded a short distance from Mr. Baer, tearing a man to fragments, and striking him in the right hip, equalizing his disabilities and relieving him from permanent lameness by a sort of compensatory arrangement, so to speak. He hobbled to the rebel redoubt before Fort Blakely, where he lay for half an hour, the feds charging on the fort which was found to be evacuated." [Note: a redoubt... fort or fort system, defensive emplacement, outside a larger fort. (Wikipedia) ]page 465, While with the 48<sup>th</sup> in Texas Captain Baer received and disposed of ordinance and munitions.

Dear Friend Libie, As I have nothing to do this afternoon I concluded to spend the time in writing a few lines to you. Although I have written at least once since I have rec'd any letters from you - Since I last wrote to you at Barrancas we have been on the move nearly continually. From Barrancas we went to Pensacola and only remained there a few days. And on the 20 of March we started out we didnt know where for. But after about two weeks of the hardest marching we ever have through swamps and mud we found ourselves at Fort Blakely on the east side of Mobile Bay. There we met with a pretty strong force well fortified. But we went to work at them skirmishing in day time and digging trenches at night and in page 2 a few days we had as good works as the Reb, and only a very short distance from theirs. And after skirmishing and digging just one week we came to the conclusion to charge their works, which we did on Sunday evening of the 9th of April. In the charge we captured about four thousand prisoners and sixty pieces of artillery. The next night after the fall of Blakely Mobile was evacuated. Selma & Montgomery were taken by a portion of Thomas' Army under command of Gen Wilson, about the same time. Consequently you see we have things pretty much our own way in this department these times as well as in the east. It is rumoured here that the war is over & the southern Confederacy played out. It might be the case for anything we know for we have not had a mail nor seen a newspaper nor heard any news for this last three weeks and there is no prospect of getting any news soon. There may not be a Boat here from

Mobile for the next two weeks. The news of the assassination of Lincoln & Seward caused a greater feeling here than anything I have ever witnessed in the Army. Men that have always been what they call Democrats and men that even voted for Valandingham and denounced Lincoln & the Administration, when the news reached page 3 us that the President was assassinated, cursed the confederacy and Jeff Davis, cursed the Rebel army & almost swore that they would raise the "Black Flag" and never lay down their arms until the south was entirely annihilated. We arrived here at Selma about a week ago all well, and have went into camp with the expectations of remaining here at least long enough to get a little rest. And for anything I know we may stay here the remainder of the time. I hope we may. I sometimes think that it will not be necessary for us to go any farther, at least I think we have fought our last Battle. If the south ever intends to come to terms they certainly will do it soon. I have not heard anything from home for some time, but I still take it for granted that all is well there until I hear to the contrary. The last letter I had from Sister ?Miller I think was written about the 20 of March. She said that you were going to teach school in our district. Consequently I will direct this to Smithville instead of Chippewa. We hav not heard anything from our prisoners since about the middle of March. At that time they were still in Texas and no page 4 prospect of Being exchanged. We have a very nice camp here but it is going to be very warm. We are camped in an open field and not a shade tree near. Selma is the prettiest city that I have seen in the south or was at one time. It is about three times as large as Wooster. But it looks pretty hard just now since Gen Wilson paid it a visit. The Arsenal, Navy Yard, Railroad Building, in fact all the public buildings & great many private residences may be in ashes. The largest & the principal manufacturing establishments in the south were at this place. All their artillery, arms & ammunition was made here. Well I must quit and go to supper. We haven't much to eat but we must have supper anyhow. Supper is over and I will finish, and take a walk through the city. I have not made any acquaintances here yet and don't intend to trouble them much. I scarcely ever go out of camp any more unless I have business. Wish I could visit your school some day when it rains. Perhaps I may get home before it closes. I have a nice tent that I captured from the Rebs at Blakely so you see I am pretty well situated these times. Wish you could call & see me some day. I might have a very pleasant time here but my partner is such an old maid that there is no getting along with him any way pleasantly. But thank fortune I have but four months more to stay with him. But I will quit for this time. I will expect a letter from you next mail. And if it don't come then I will look for it until it does come. Give my kindest regards to Jno & Mrs Huffman and all the rest.

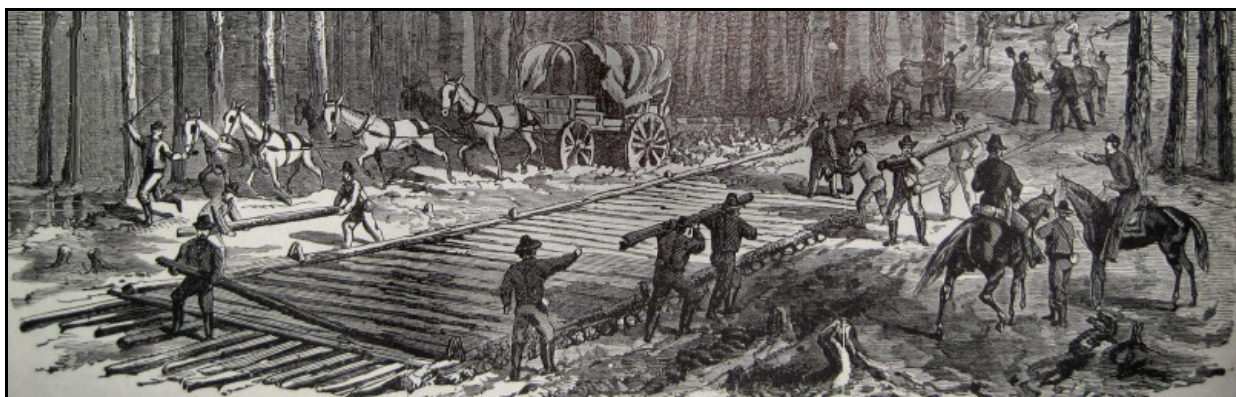

They took transports across the lake and marched via Pensacola, Florida, to **Fort Blakely, Alabama**. They were obliged to build a corduroy road for the passage of their wagons on this march. [See image] After a siege lasting a week they charged on Fort Blakely and captured the fort with many prisoners. This was the last engagement of the war. They were then transported to **Galveston, Texas**, and thence to **Houston, Texas**, where they were finally discharged October 14, 1865."

Page 187 "On the 2d day of August [1865], a portion of the Regiment embarked and proceeded to Houston, Texas, by way of Buffalo Bayou. The remaining companies followed soon after, by way of Trinity river. Arriving at Houston, we relieved the 34th Iowa, who were to be mustered out."

"The Regiment was now sent by companies to various towns on the railroads running into Houston. Capt. Cochran, with Company C, was stationed at Columbia, on the Brazos river, 85 miles from Houston. While stationed there they buried [page 188] the brother of President Johnson, who had been fatally injured while boating. The company also lost two of its men from malarial fever.

During the summer the Regiment suffered from **break-bone fever**, causing many to be sick. At one

time it was difficult to provide guards for duty. It was not, however, fatal to any of them.

On the 28th of October, we were relieved from duty at Houston, and ordered to relieve the 24th Ind. Vet. Vols. from duty at **Galveston**, who were then being mustered out of service. In due time we reached Galveston, and took possession of their comfortable quarters. ....

From the time the Regiment returned to Galveston, in October, 1865, until our muster-out, we performed all kinds of garrison duty, and the officers were more or less on detached service, but we were not well satisfied with our situation or treatment, for we felt that we were detained in the service longer than was actually necessary. In fact, many expressed themselves in such a way as to [page 189] leave no doubt of the feelings of the Regiment."

Picket Shots: "Flag of the Harriet Lane. Apropos of the capture of the Harriet Lane, as described in the history of the rebellion now running in The National Tribune, Comrade **J. W. Bricker writes from Smithville, O.**: 'The 114th Ohio got into Galveston, Tex., in **June, 1865**. The Buckeye soldiers were looking over the town, and found what they understood to be a rebel Signal corps office where there were many flags on shelves. **David L. Hoff, of Co. H, 120th Ohio, was at that time in the 114th, his regiment having been used up on an expedition up Red River in May, 1864.** In the supposed rebel signal room Comrade Hoff picked up a large and beautiful United States flag, which was labeled, '**Colors of the Harriet Lane, captured Jan. 1, 1863,**' as told in the history of the rebellion. He said, 'I guess I will take this for my share,' and carried it away with him. He displayed the flag on numerous occasions at his home in Smithville, O., but where it is now I do not know, Comrade Hoff having been for some years at the National Military Home.' " [David Hoff died in 1918.] [The [Harriet Lane](#) was captured at the Battle of Galveston, 1 Jan 1863.]
